Two Roles, One System

Every community in the UK is represented at both a national and a local level.

Member of Parliament

They sit in Parliament. They debate laws. They help shape national policy.

Much of their work takes place beyond the local area.

Local Councillor

They work within your community. They deal with everyday issues such as:

- housing
- roads
- local services

They are often more directly involved in day-to-day concerns.

Both are elected. Both represent you. But they operate in different parts of the system.





A Difference in Participation

When it comes to voting:

General Elections

Turnout is often **higher** in general elections.

Local Elections

But **much lower** in local elections.

Why This Matters

Local Councillor

Local decisions shape your **everyday environment**.

Member of Parliament

National decisions shape the **direction of the country**.

Both shape your life in different ways.

Yet participation is not always equal.



The Reality

Whether you vote or not:

Decisions are still made

Outcomes still apply

Representation still operates

The system continues either way.

The Question

If both levels of representation matter,
why does participation differ?





Why Participation Differs

Participation is not always equal across elections.

General elections receive more attention.

They are widely covered, discussed, and understood as moments that shape the direction of the country.

Local elections receive less visibility.

They are often seen as less significant, even though they affect everyday life more directly.

This creates a gap in understanding:

National decisions feel more important.

Local decisions feel less visible.

As a result, participation is often higher at the national level, and lower at the local level.

The Message

You vote for two kinds of representatives.

One helps shape the country, (Member of Parliament).

The other, (Local Councillor) helps shape your everyday environment.

Understanding the system is the first step. Participation is what gives it meaning.
